One of the biggest challenges for Madison was education. Like most other children, Madison started off her educational journey in the school system. She went to school every day and everyone did their best, but it was just not a good fit for her. Madison's existing medical conditions worsened and she was getting sick very frequently. The illnesses caused regression in other areas and Madison was not able to learn as she was very stressed.

Knowing that a change was necessary, Madison's grandparents decided to move to home schooling. They knew that there had to be a different way to help Madison learn and they were concerned because when she left school at the end of grade one, she was not able to recognize letters, numbers or colours or even hold a crayon. Her grandmother worked hard with her to develop a curriculum to let her learn at her own pace and in her own way and it has been very successful for her.


In a little over a year, Madison has learned to sing the alphabet, count to 10, hold a crayon and trace letters and lines. She is also learning to draw pictures and use colours. They have worked on physiotherapy and speech goals as well.

Madison and her family also joined a home-schooling group where they go on field trips and experience community with new friends. She has visited an apple orchard, Safety Village and a museum. They also participated in the Adopt an Elder program at a local long term care facility.



It has been a big year of growth and change for Madison and her grandparents are so proud of her. Late last summer, Madison completed all aspects of Kindergarten and it was time for the graduation party to celebrate. Her family and friends were invited to come together for snacks and celebration. She was presented with a diploma and a special science award, while in her purple cap and gown! The accomplishment was celebrated with a trip to Rounds Ranch for pictures and horseback riding.



Did you know that Country 93, one of our awesome local radio stations, celebrates local heroes?


We're so PROUD to see both Deanna and Karen recognized for their efforts.

Deanna and Karen found them, immediately called 911 and set out on performing CPR until the paramedics arrived. Thanks to her quick thinking, medical training, and calm demeanour under pressure, the person in crisis survived. This act of bravery not only saved this person's life, but highlighted Deanna's deep commitment to her community and her readiness to act selflessly in a moment of crisis. Her actions attest to a profound sense of care and responsibility for others, which serves as an inspiration not only to her team, but to everyone who has the privilege of knowing her."

TWENTY SIX YEARS LATER....A PERSONAL ESSAY

Back in 1991 the doctor had found a tumor on the base of my brain and in 1998 I had it removed, I spent 19 hours on the operating table. I had to learn how to walk all over again and I could not go for walks around the hospital wing without a nurse in case I fall. I ended up with 3 spinal taps, the doctor could not find out what was wrong, so they wanted to do another one and I said 'no way' because they hurt... it is like getting shot with a bullet. When I got home, I had a walker which was no good in the snow so after a while I got rid of the walker and went to a cane and I had to have therapy on my right hand because with it being out straight for 19 hours, I could not move my baby finger. I could not go downtown without a babysitter in case I walked into a moving car, I walked into parking meters and light posts because of my balance. The tumor was imbedded around my main nerves which was my left ear, and today I still have side effects like my balance and my left side of my face is numb. See I was born with tumors and now I have only one left which I have to put up with because it cannot be removed. And this year it will be 26 years that I had the operation, and I have to wear a hearing aid in my left ear to help with my balance.




